PRIMAVERA RECEIVES NEARLY \$1 MILLION IN VA GRANT FUNDS

TO PROVIDE COLLABORATIVE HOUSING ASSISTANCE TO VETERANS

After a highly competitive national grant process, the Veteran's Administration (VA) selected Primavera as one of only 85 recipients of its coveted Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF) grant. This grant, which is a part of a new VA program designed to meet the VA's broader plan to prevent and end homelessness among veterans, will bring \$887,416 into the Tucson community to fund essential services for our veterans.

"This new homeless prevention program will provide additional comprehensive support to veterans who have served honorably, and now find themselves in a downward spiral toward despair and homelessness," said VA Secretary Eric K. Shinseki. "This program expands our capacity to act before a veteran becomes homeless and to target the problem of family homelessness."

This funding comes at a critical time. While the nation as a whole has seen a slight decrease in the number of homeless veterans, Tucson's veteran population continues to increase. The most recent CHALENG Point of Contact



Disabled Veteran Bill Mitchell, who advocates for Veterans rights, says "the programs Primavera provides for Veterans are some of the best in the country". Bill went through our HomeOwnership program and says "thanks to Primavera I'm back in a home again".

Services assessment, a VA report compiled from surveys provided by local VA branches and other area service providers, indicated that there were 869 veterans on the streets of Tucson who were homeless in 2009. More recent data from the 2011 Homeless Management Information System, a web-based case management tracking system, shows 959 Tucson veterans are struggling with homelessness. At Primavera, 19% of our 8,500 participants are veterans.

To address the needs of the veterans who are at risk of homelessness here in Tucson, Primavera and our local partners Old Pueblo Community Services, Esperanza En Escalante, New Beginnings for Women and Children and MEB Management Services, have created a new program—Project Action for Veterans.

This program will provide 120 Tucson veterans' families with temporary financial assistance for housing, along with life-skills classes, and individual service planning to assist in securing VA and other public benefits. Ultimately, this program will create housing stability for veterans residing in or transitioning to permanent housing.

"The Primavera Foundation and its community partners have vast experience serving veterans, and this funding is essential in strengthening and expanding our reach to Tucson's underserved service men and women, and their families," said Peggy Hutchison, the Primavera Foundation's Chief Executive Officer.

"This program is not only going to save hundreds of veterans from homelessness, but it will also provide Primavera and our partners the opportunity to provide more in-depth individual service planning and life-skills classes like financial education and job skills," Hutchison said. "We must break the cycle of poverty experienced by returning veterans."

MEALS FOR OTHERS, MEMORIES OF MOM

In July 2010, our mother, Shirley J. Wahl, passed away after a several-year struggle with vascular dementia. As July 2011 approached, we faced the impending first anniversary of Mom's passing, as well as what would have been Mom's 81st birthday – two very emotional milestones for my family.

One day, I received a call from my sister Sandi Heilman, who is the Director of Communications and Outreach for St. Mark's United Methodist Church. St. Mark's has long been a supporter of Primavera, with a monthly meal team that serves the 100-bed Men's Shelter. Sandi noticed that July 9 was the designated slot for St. Mark's July meal team and she had an idea. What if we, along with our husbands, signed up for that slot and made and served a special meal to the men in the shelter in honor and loving memory of our mother? It sounded like a perfect way to pay tribute to the woman who taught us to be kind and generous to others, as well as an opportunity to do something with a positive focus that would help us to navigate those emotionally challenging days.

As we began to formulate our plan, we suddenly found additional support we hadn't expected. A friend of the family, Gabino ("Gabby") Llovet, who owns the local Waffle House restaurants - and who has been an incredible partner of Primavera's, hiring many candidates from our Primavera Works and Vocations for Veterans programs - instantly announced that he was "in" for assisting us with the meal, and stated emphatically "I'll provide the meat!" Since I work for Primavera, I decided to ask the staff at the Men's Shelter for input in our menu planning process. What do the men love to

eat, but not receive very often? What would make a special meal for them? (One thing that Mom ALWAYS did for us was to make whatever special meal our brother Kirby, my sister, and I requested on each of our birthdays. We figured that doing that for someone else in honor of Mom's birthday was a great way to keep that legacy alive!) We learned that while the men get lots of pasta and chili - not surprisingly, since when cooking for 100+ people, a budget has to stretch very far - the men don't often receive and would LOVE to have beef. In addition, many of the men are diabetic and must control their intake of certain starches and processed foods. Suddenly, a homemade steak dinner with all the trimmings was in the works!

Another close friend of our family, Bill Nugent, owner of The Shanty in downtown Tucson (another long-term partner/supporter of Primavera), heard about our plans and decided at once to contribute to the cause as well. Bill and his sister Judy Nugent contacted local retailers and were able to procure generous donations of personal hygiene items. They then made "goodie bags" by hand for each of the men, each containing a toothbrush, toothpaste, a toothbrush case, bar of soap, razor, comb, and washcloth, which were distributed to the men after dinner.

What a wonderful and meaningful experience this became. The evening of July 9, the men at the Shelter were absolutely gracious, considerate, and kind. We brought a photo of Mom framed with a few words about the meaning behind this meal, and so many of the men made a point to offer us genuine words of condolence, heartfelt thanks, and special thoughts for Mom. (Some even stood in front of Mom's photo after the meal, offering quiet blessings and gratitude to her.) Our hearts were full and it felt like the perfect way to honor the memory of a wonderful woman who instilled a giving heart in each of her children.

Thank you to each and every one of you (donors, staff, community partners, program participants - and especially in this instance, St. Mark's, Waffle House, and the Shanty) for making Primavera a place that provides so many ways for legacies and memories to be honored, in the midst of the new memories and success stories that are being created each and every day.

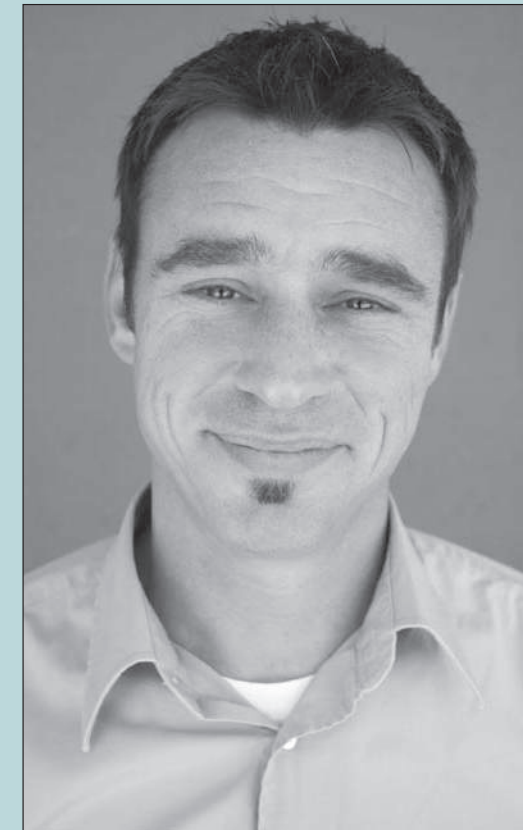

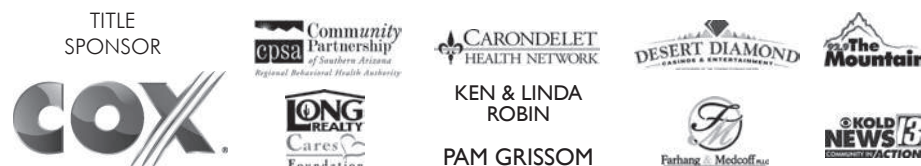
